Agenda Item: Welcome

Presenter: Robbie Fletcher, Ed.D., Commissioner of Education, Kentucky Department of Education

Summary of Discussion:

Prior to Fletcher's welcome, Melanie Callahan asked the new Teacher Advisory Council (TAC) liaison Justin Edwards to introduce himself. Edwards briefly introduced himself.

Fletcher shared the following:

- There were 1,766 certified openings as of September 2024. House Bill (HB) 441 would allow retired teachers to return to the classroom.
- HB 253 removes teacher tuition repayment and provides a tuition-free pathway to becoming a teacher
- HB 241 moves schools from the required 170 days to 1,062 hours of instruction
- 200 bills are being tracked and updates can be found on the Legislative Research Commission (LRC) website
- Town Halls all nine have been completed; over 600 people attended; districts that have been providing vibrant learning experiences to their students presented on their efforts; Framework 3.0 will be out soon, and advocacy efforts will ramp up this summer; the final Framework will go to legislators in 2026

Feedback:

Chad Davidson asked about Title Funding. Fletcher said extended Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funding is the only thing withheld so far. The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) has followed the process and requested a payout recently. KDE staff expect to receive those funds. Title funds are formula based. It would require an act of Congress to remove U.S. DoE.

Kevin Daily – HB 324 – Is the licensure process changing? Fletcher stated that the Education Professional Standards Board needs to remain over licensure; it should not go to the local level for the sake of consistency.

Emmanuel Anama – HB 241 – how do you think this will play out? Fletcher said it allows districts to add time to their days; schools could go until June 10. Prefer to have done by first week of June.

HB 268 – Fletcher said KDE is advocating to remove this from HB 241. Two different issues.

Carla Criswell – Jefferson County has a Diversity Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Department. What is KDE's stand on DEI? Fletcher said KDE is still a resource for districts to ensure every student has opportunity and access.

Montgomery shared how she began to see value in herself and how teachers made the difference in her life. She went on to describe how she's been able to work with people from all over the world and gave two examples of this. Montgomery spoke about her own experience of being a parent of a student and how the community held her up in a time of struggle. "Your story matters because you matter." Agenda Item: Kentucky Board of Education (KBE) Non-voting Teacher Member Applications and Selection

Then, she went over: the methods and frequency of meetings, links to additional information and the application, and the administrative regulation that defines the role. Lastly, she requested TAC members interested in serving on the TAC Special Committee to review and recommend finalist applications to the KBE contact, the TAC chair or the TAC liaison.

Agenda Item: Positive Behavior Intervention Strategies Report

Presenter: Cristy Tomes, Program Consultant, KDE Division of Student Success

Summary of Discussion:

Cristy Tomes - After introducing herself, Tomes spoke about her office and the people who work with Positive Behavior Intervention Strategies (PBIS). She discussed how she got into PBIS and the fidelity inventory. Cristi informed the group that the fidelity inventory will be updated by next year to version 3.0. She went over the inventory and how to use it to fidelity. She showed the walk-through inventory tool the PBIS team uses. Tomes went over some of the schools she oversees in her region. She then went over the application for the fidelity inventory and the deadlines to apply. She discussed how Tableau is used to analyze student behavior data. She concluded her presentation by discussing what a PBIS team is, the roles of its members and the goal of 250 schools applying for fidelity.
