Educators Rising

- KDE hosted the annual Educators Rising Kentucky State Conference and Competition at Bellarmine University on March 3.
- Approximately 266 high school students from across the Commonwealth who are interested in pursuing careers in the field of education attended.
- The one-day conference featured 21 competitive events that allowed student educators to showcase the skills they have developed in educational sciences and leadership.
- Professionals in the field lead or moderated presentations.
- Kentucky 2022 Teacher of the Year Willie Edward Taylor Carver Jr. delivered the keynote address.







Glass Visits Western Kentucky School Districts

- Commissioner Jason E. Glass and KBE Chair Lu S. Young visited several western Kentucky school districts March 1-2 that were impacted by the December 2021 tornados.
- Students and staff at Earlington Elementary (Hopkins County), shared stories about the days after the storms when the school became a communitywide distribution center.
- Dawson Springs Independent Superintendent Leonard Whalen said Dawson Springs High School also was used as a community distribution center for donations that poured in.
- Mayfield Independent Superintendent Joe Henderson and Graves County Superintendent Matthew Madding described how Mayfield High School acted as shelter for those displaced and injured.
- Henderson said cleanup and recovery in the community has made a lot of progress, and school officials will continue to work with community members and city and state representatives to do whatever they can to help heal their community in the years to come.

2022-2023 Commissioner's Student Advisory Council

- Public school students currently in grades 9-11 are invited to apply for the 13 open positions on the 2022-2023 Commissioner's Student Advisory Council.
- The council meets with the commissioner and KDE staff to discuss how decisions made at the state level are affecting students throughout Kentucky.
- Members provide feedback from a student perspective on critical issues impacting Kentucky's students and schools.
- The application deadline is April 4. Interested students should apply via Google form.





2023 Kentucky Teacher of the Year

- For the first time, nominations were received from every county in Kentucky.
- Almost 2,000 nominations were received.
- All nominated teachers must complete a formal application by March 21.
- A blue-ribbon panel of education professionals from around the state will judge all applications in March.
- Up to 24 Valvoline Teacher Achievement Award winners will be announced in the spring. The top nine contenders will receive additional evaluations, which will culminate in the selection of the 2023 Kentucky Teacher of the Year.





Nominations for Karem Award Close March 18

- The Kentucky Board of Education (KBE) is still accepting nominations for the <u>Karem Award for Excellence in</u> <u>Education Policy</u>.
- Nominations are open through March 18.
- The award, named for former board chairman David Karem, is given in the spring of each year to state policymakers, education leaders or citizens who have made notable, state-level contributions to the improvement of Kentucky's public education system.






Student Artwork Display in Commissioner's Office





Creating Acceleration Plans

- Grounded in evidence-based strategies and practices that provide students with more time and dedicated attention focused on immersing students in grade-level standards
- Also should include strategies that support students' socialemotional and behavioral needs so students are in a physical and emotional state that enables them to learn
- Multi-part and multi-year process
- Summer AND throughout the academic school year



Accelerating Student Learning During the Summer and Academic School Year

Guidance includes:

- Summer learning supports
- Ongoing academic school year supports
 - Quality, standards-aligned Tier 1 instruction
 - High-intensity tutoring
 - Vacation academies

Research-Based Summer Learning

- Based on research from the RAND Organization (2018) and the Wallace Foundation (2019)
- Recommendations meet ESSA Tier I standards for impacting student achievement in math and Tier III standards for impacting student achievement in reading and social-emotional learning

Summer Learning Programs

Recommended structure:

- Five to six weeks in duration
- Five days of programming per week
- 60-90 minutes of math and 90-120 minutes of reading/writing instruction per day
- Two-three hours for enrichment activities
- Small classes of up to 15 students per teacher

Schools/districts may need to adapt structure based on local needs assessment, student data and available resources.



Eight Evidence-Based Practices for Summer Learning

- 1. Use an effective planning process.
- 2. Use highly effective teachers and provide high-quality professional learning.
- 3. Ensure sufficient time on task. Maximize active class instruction.
- 4. Prioritize student recruitment and attendance.

- 5. Use a common local curriculum and HQIRs matched to student needs.
- 6. Offer carefully planned enrichment.
- 7. Focus on creating a unique positive climate.
- 8. Implement cost-saving measures.



Updated Resources

- TNTP Learning Acceleration for All: Guide designed to help system leaders create a plan to accelerate every student over the next three to five years.
- <u>Summer Learning Planning Guide:</u> NIET resource drawing on research from the Annenberg Institute for School Reform (Brown University) to assist education leaders in making decisions regarding summer learning programs.
- TNTP Planning for Summer School 2021: Resource for determining the best approaches to summer learning as a first step in accelerating student learning over the next three to five years.
- Center for Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning:
 <u>District Resource Center:</u> Web-based guidance and resources to help organize, implement and continuously improve social-emotional learning.

FY23 Funding

Senate Bill 1 (2021 Special Session)

- Senate Bill 1 once again froze funding to previous year levels
- 2021-2022 ADA data will not be submitted to KDE
- Payments for FY23 will be paid based on previous year ADA
- Districts will continue to receive funding based on the ADA submitted for the 2018-2019 or 2019-2020 school year



Attendance Options

- District-elected 2018-2019 SAAR data for the 2019-2020 SEEK, 2020-2021 SEEK, and 2021-2022 SEEK and the district wants to continue to use 2018-2019 SAAR data for 2022-2023 SEEK
 - ➤ No action needed Only option for districts that chose 2018-2019
- District-elected 2019-2020 SAAR data for the 2020-2021 SEEK and 2021-2022 SEEK, and the district wants to continue to use 2019-2020 SAAR data for 2022-2023 SEEK
 - No action needed
- District-elected 2019-2020 SAAR data for the 2020-2021 SEEK and 2021-2022 SEEK, and the district wants to REVERT to 2018-2019 SAAR data for 2022-2023 SEEK



Funding Bills Filed – NOT YET PASSED

- HB 639
 - Growth Calculation SY 2022-2023
 - Loss adjustment 3%
 - Appropriation
- HB 703
 - Transition to Average Daily Membership
 - Effective July 1, 2024



School Security Funds Request Guidance

Reminder - School Security Funds Request Guidance

School Security Funding (SSR) was included in House Bill 352 (2020), which allocated monies to each district for upgrading security measures in schools. All School Security Request forms are due to KDE by May 31, 2022, in order to have them approved before they expire on June 30, 2022.

The six items identified in SB 1 (2019) are to aid in controlling the access to each school building but <u>are not limited to</u> the items listed below:

- Electronic door locks;
- Cameras;
- Intercom:
- Classroom door locks;
- Classroom door window coverings; and
- Exterior door access control.

KRS 158.162 School Security Requirements

- All schools in a district must be in compliance with the facility security requirements found in KRS 158.162(3)(d) no later than July 1, 2022.
- A district with a school not in compliance by July 1, 2022, shall not be eligible for approval for new building construction or expansion in the 2022-2023 school year and any subsequent year without verification of compliance, except for facility improvements that specifically address school safety and security issues or in essential cases for the protection of student or staff health and safety.

School Security Risk Assessments

As of the State Security Marshal's most recent bi-monthly report of schools that are non-compliant with 158.162(3)(d), access control mandates of the School Safety and Resiliency Act:

- Compliance officers have completed risk assessments on 873 schools (68%).
- 173 (19%) of schools assessed were not in compliance with the access control mandates.
- Most the deficiencies are unsecured exterior or interior doors that can be easily corrected.
- Reassessment to ensure individual deficiencies have been corrected.



ESSER Data Collection

- This report includes ESSER funds received under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act.
- In response to public comment, the data collection for the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund annual performance reporting period has been adjusted.
- Reporting period has been moved back to May 2022.

Recap

- 2/3 of the way through the session
- 1,165 bills filed
 - 783 in House
 - 382 in Senate
- Unusual number of "shell bills"
- Very little movement to date

Remaining Priorities

- Budget
- Tax reform
- Everything else
 - School choice, charter schools, CRT-related bills

Budget Process

- HB1
- Waiting on Senate to pass their version
- Will then go to free conference committee
- There, the chambers agree on the final budget to send to the governor
- Governor has line-item veto power in the budget
- General Assembly can override a veto with a simple majority vote in each chamber



House Bills of Interest

- HB8: Tax reform bill
- HB9: Public charter school bill
- HB14/HB18: CRT bills
- HB23: Transgender sports
 - 50 cosponsors; limited to grades 6-12, passed out of committee
- HB33: School facilities bill
 - Among other things, delete reporting requirement for efficient design
 - Voted out of the House, assigned to Senate Education
- HB44: Mental health in district attendance polices
 - Passed out of House, assigned to Senate Education



House Bills of Interest (part 2)

- HB51: Mask mandates
 - Passed out of committee
- **HB63:** Require an SRO by Aug 1, 2022
 - If sufficient funds and personnel are not available, school districts shall fulfill the requirement on a per-campus basis as approved by the state school security marshal.
- **HB126:** FAFSA graduation information requirement
 - Passed out of committee, awaiting vote on the House floor
- HB194: High School Equivalency Diplomas in alternative education programs
 - Passed out of the House, assigned to Senate Education
- HB226: Companion to SB9
 - Passed out of the House with House Committee Sub 1; assigned to Senate A&R

House Bills of Interest (part 3)

- HB270: Child abuse awareness and prevention instruction; "Erin's Law"
 - Passed out of the House; floor amendment added by sponsor
- **HB277:** Create a new expedited alternative certification pathway (Option 9)
 - Assigned to Education
- HB305: School choice bill. Companion to SB50
 - Has not been assigned to committee yet; 20 co-sponsors, including the Speaker
- HB397: Waive up to 15 student attendance days for days school districts were closed due to the western Kentucky tornado disaster; consider days waived under this Act as completed employment contract days for school personnel
 - Passed out of the House
- HB487: CRT bill
 - Introduced late last week; not yet assigned to committee
 - Same sponsor as HB18



House Bills of Interest (part 4)

- **HB522:** Would increase the minimum amount for advertising and bidding school building projects from \$7,500 to \$30,000
- HB527: Establish a student loan forgiveness program for teachers and administrators
- HB601: Require teachers be compensated for noninstructional planning time within their school day during which they are required to supervise or instruct students
- **HB623:** Same as 601, but also expands the program eligibility of the Work Ready Kentucky Scholarship Program to include a program that leads to a bachelor's degree in education in a critical shortage area
- **HB639:** Require growth in enrollment to be included in the 2022-2023 school year SEEK calculation utilizing end-of-year membership numbers, require a loss adjustment to assist districts with greater than 3% loss in student enrollment



House Bills of Interest (part 5)

- HB703: Transition the school funding model from using average daily attendance to average daily membership
- HB704: Establish the Teacher Recruitment Student Loan Forgiveness Program



Senate Bills of Interest

- **SB1:** Principal selection and curriculum decisions moved to Superintendent
 - Passed out on a vote of 25-9 on the 8th
- SB9: Early literacy education
 - Read to Succeed Act
 - Would not impact RTA
 - Passed out of the Senate
- SB50: School choice (no co-sponsors)
- SB60: Head Start bill
 - Passed out of the Senate with Senate Committee Sub 1



Senate Bills of Interest (part 2)

- SB61: Deleting end-of-course examination and ACT benchmark requirements from the early high school graduation program
 - Passed out of the Senate
- SB83: Transgender sports
 - Passed out of the Senate
- SB102: Reporting information on school-based mental health services providers in the district to the KDE
 - Passed out of the Senate
- SB138: CRT-related bill




Senate Bills of Interest (part 3)

- SB151: School breakfast during instructional time
- SB215: RTA/RTS bill; same as HB93 which was rolled into HB226
- SB284: An act relating to financing of school building projects
- SB351: Require a school district's COVID-19 masking policy to allow parents to opt out for any reason

Inter-District Public School Choice (HB563 from 2021)

- Recommended language sets up a structure of:
 - (1) Providing everyone with notice of the process and deadlines for enrolling non-residents;
 - (2) Prevents "cherry picking" by indicating the nonresident district must utilize criteria no greater than it uses for enrolling its own students;
 - (3) Sets up some structure to avoid bouncing around among school districts; and
 - (4) Puts a notice structure in place so that if a resident district will lose a big portion of its population, it has some advance notice to make necessary decisions
- Status and Next Steps
 - KDE provided model language to key members of both chambers.
 - Meetings with other key legislators scheduled
 - Providing model language to legislative leadership planned






COVID-19 hospitalization, ICU, and ventilator census in Kentucky hospitals - July 11, 2020 - March 6, 2022















% of County Population Vaccinated

Kentucky COVID-19 Vaccination Dashboard





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











Kentucky COVID-19 Vaccination Dashboard








% of County Population Vaccinated
