Lesson Opening:

Activate background knowledge about the Titanic, specifically reasons why some third-class passengers wanted to immigrate to America, from previous lessons as well as some classmates' personal experiences of moving to America.

Lesson Procedures:

- Introduce relevant vocabulary: immigrated, inspected, moment, opportunity.
- Read aloud "Sailing to America" from Wonders 2023, Grade 3, Unit 2.
- Ask and answer text-dependent questions throughout read aloud.
- Ask and answer inferential questions about characters' feelings about immigrating based on text and illustrations.
- Collaborate as partners to describe the characters' experiences immigrating to America.

Lesson Closing:

Writing to Learn: Using what we've learned about the passengers on the Titanic, the characters in "Sailing to America," as well as some of your personal experiences, explain why some people migrate. Students share their writing, and the class determines the theme of "Sailing to America."
