- 8 NECESSITY, FUNCTION, AND CONFORMITY: KRS 156.029 (9) [(7)] requires the Kentucky
- 9 Board of Education (KBE) to adopt policies and administrative regulations by which the
- 10 Kentucky Department of Education (department) shall be governed in planning and operating
- programs within its jurisdiction. KRS 156.070(5) requires the KBE, upon the recommendation
- of the Commissioner of Education (Commissioner), to establish policy or act on all programs,
- 13 services, and other matters which are within the administrative responsibility of the
- department. KRS 158.070 requires the KBE to promulgate an administrative regulation to
- 15 prescribe the conditions and procedures for local education agencies (districts) to be approved
- 16 for the nontraditional instruction program. This administrative regulation establishes the
- 17 requirements and approval process for districts to be approved for the nontraditional instruction
- 18 program.
- 19 Section 1. Definitions. (1) "Comprehensive District Improvement Plan" shall have the same
- 20 meaning as defined in 703 KAR 5:225, Section 1(3).

- 1 (2) "Continuation of learning" means the provision of rigorous educational activities that extend
- 2 <u>or maintain progress within the established curriculum and instructional sequence.</u>
- 3 (3)([2)] "Instructional delivery method" means the delivery system and instructional techniques
- 4 used in meeting the learning needs of students regardless of their physical location.
- 5 (4) "District Nontraditional Instruction Contact" means the designated individual responsible for
- 6 overseeing the implementation, coordination, and compliance of nontraditional instruction
- 7 activities within a school district.
- 8 (5) "Learning loss" means a measurable decline or stagnation in student academic
- 9 performance resulting from short-term interruptions to traditional, in-person instruction.
- 10 (6)[(3)] "Minimum school term" or "school term" is defined in KRS 158.070(1)(b).
- 11 (7)[(4)] "Nontraditional instruction day" means a day during the school term that a local school
- district is closed for health or safety reasons that is approved by the commissioner, pursuant to
- 13 KRS 158.070(9), to be the equivalent to a student attendance day.
- 14 (8)([5)] "Nontraditional instruction plan" means the strategy approved by the commissioner and
- implemented by a local school district to ensure instruction on nontraditional instruction days is
- 16 a continuation of learning that is occurring on regular student attendance days as required by
- 17 KRS 158.070(9).
- (9)[(6)]"Professional learning plan" means the strategy implemented to ensure staff in a local
- 19 school district acquire, enhance, and refine the knowledge, skills, practices, and dispositions
- 20 necessary to create and support high levels of learning for all students.
- 21 (10)[(7)] "Student attendance day" is defined in KRS 158.070(1)(e).
- 22 Section 2. Nontraditional Instruction Plan. (1) A district seeking commissioner approval,
- 23 pursuant to KRS 158.070, of a nontraditional instruction plan shall annually incorporate it within
- the Comprehensive District Improvement Plan.

- 1 (2) A nontraditional instruction plan incorporated within the Comprehensive District
- 2 Improvement Plan shall:
- 3 (a) Provide an overview of the district's vision for ensuring a continuation of learning when
- 4 implementing nontraditional instruction;
- 5 (b) Describe in detail:
- 6 1. How instruction shall be delivered for students in nontraditional settings;
- 7 2. The steps the district shall take to ensure a continuation of learning occurs for students in
- 8 nontraditional settings;
- 9 3. How, if at all and to the extent permitted by applicable statutes and administrative
- regulations, the district shall ensure a continuation of learning occurs for those students
- utilizing, for any reason, nontraditional instruction during time periods when the district may be
- offering and providing in-person instruction to other students;
- 4. How the district shall ensure a continuation of learning for students with Individual Education
- 14 Plans in nontraditional settings;
- 15 5. Additional efforts that may be necessary to ensure a continuation of learning for other
- special populations of students in nontraditional settings;
- 17 6. How the district has coordinated or will coordinate with other educational entities to ensure a
- 18 continuation of learning for students in nontraditional settings;
- 19 7. How teachers shall instruct, support, and communicate with students in order to ensure
- 20 academic progress as well as promote social and emotional well-being for students in
- 21 nontraditional settings;
- 22 8. The professional learning activities the district shall provide certified staff to ensure they
- 23 have the skills necessary to provide a continuation of learning for students in nontraditional
- 24 settings;

- 1 9. How the district shall deploy all staff when school is closed to in-person instruction;
- 2 10. The partnerships the district has established with other community agencies to increase
- 3 opportunities for a continuation of learning for students in nontraditional settings; [and]
- 4 11. The district's communication plan for parents, students, and community members for
- 5 students in nontraditional settings;
- 6 12. The district's plan for collecting and archiving the evidence of student learning samples
- 7 required by section 3(3) of this regulation; and
- 8 13. The name and contact information for the districts nontraditional instruction contact.
- 9 (c) Explain how the nontraditional instruction plan relates to district goals; and
- 10 (d) Provide other evidence deemed necessary by the department to effectively review and
- 11 approve or deny a district's nontraditional instruction plan.
- 12 (3) The department shall provide technical assistance, upon request, to districts prior to the
- incorporation of a nontraditional instruction plan within the Comprehensive District
- 14 Improvement Plan.
- 15 (4) A district shall submit the nontraditional instruction plan to the department by May 1 for
- implementation at the beginning of the upcoming school term.
- 17 (5) The commissioner or his designee shall review and approve or deny a completed
- nontraditional instruction plan within forty-five (45) days from receipt.
- 19 (6) An approved nontraditional instruction plan shall be effective only for one school year.
- 20 (7) [(6)] (a) A district approved to participate in the nontraditional instruction program may
- amend its nontraditional instruction plan as needed at any time by submitting a written
- 22 amendment request to the department.
- 23 (b) The amendment request shall contain a description of the amendment, proposed timeline
- 24 for implementation, and justification for the request.

- 1 (c) The Commissioner or his designee shall review the amended nontraditional instruction plan
- 2 and approve or deny it within forty-five (45) days of the amendment submission.
- 3 (d) Amendments made to a district approved plan shall not be implemented until after the
- 4 amendment is approved by the department.
- 5 Section 3. Documentation [Use] of Nontraditional Instruction Days. (1) Upon approval of a
- 6 <u>district's nontraditional instruction plan</u>, [If a district is approved by the commissioner or his
- 7 designee to participate in the nontraditional instruction program, the district may apply for and]
- 8 the commissioner may approve the use of nontraditional instruction days on days when the
- 9 district is closed for health or safety reasons pursuant to KRS 158.070.
- 10 [(2) The district shall seek approval from the commissioner to use one (1) or more
- 11 nontraditional instruction days by submitting a request and appropriate supplemental
- 12 documentation, as required by the department, to the department within thirty (30) days
- 13 following the day the district was closed for health or safety reasons.]
- 14 (2) An approved nontraditional instruction plan grants the district the ability to use one (1) or
- more nontraditional instruction days. Each day must be properly recorded in the statewide
- student information system prior to the last day of the school year.
- 17 [(3) The commissioner shall approve or deny a district's use of one (1) or more nontraditional
- 18 instruction days within thirty (30) days from receipt of the district's request and appropriate
- 19 supplemental documentation, as required by the department. A request to use one (1) or more
- 20 nontraditional instruction days shall be denied by the commissioner if the district fails to supply
- 21 clear
- 22 (3) Districts shall maintain an archive of clear evidence demonstrating that a continuation of
- 23 learning from regular student attendance days occurs on nontraditional instruction days. Clear
- 24 evidence may include:

- 1 (a) Examples of student work;
- 2 (b) Lesson plans; [or]
- 3 [(c) Curriculum maps.]
- 4 (c) Reports from online learning management systems;
- 5 (d) Examples of teacher-student communication; or
- 6 (e) Other documentation determined appropriate by the district nontraditional instruction
- 7 <u>contact in consultation with the Department.</u>
- 8 (4) The district archive described in subsection 3 of this section shall include the following:
- 9 (a) For students in Kindergarten through Fifth Grade, one piece of clear evidence of student
- learning for each grade level for reading, math, and one other content area for each
- 11 nontraditional instruction day; and
- 12 (b) For students in sixth through twelfth grade, one piece of clear evidence of student learning
- 13 <u>for each grade level in each content area for each nontraditional instructional day.</u>
- 14 Section 4. Monitoring [and Revocation] of Nontraditional Instruction Programs. (1) At the
- 15 conclusion of each school term, a district [approved by the commissioner or his designee to
- participate in the nontraditional instruction program may be required to participate in
- 17 monitoring conducted by [receive an annual site visit from] a review team selected and trained
- by the department. The purpose of the monitoring [site visit] is to monitor the district's progress
- in implementing the approved nontraditional instruction plan. Monitoring may be performed on
- or off site as determined by the Commissioner or his designee.
- 21 (2) If monitoring [a site visit] is conducted by the department, it [the site visit] shall:
- 22 (a) Be made following adequate advanced notice to the district; and
- 23 (b) Include the gathering of information through the examination of records related to the
- 24 district's implementation of the approved nontraditional instruction plan, including amendments

- 1 if applicable, and through interviews with district leadership, staff, and students as well as other
- 2 stakeholders.
- 3 (3) In addition to any monitoring [site visit] that may be conducted pursuant to subsections (1)
- 4 and (2) of this section, a district [approved by the commissioner or his designee to participate
- 5 in the nontraditional instruction program] shall, upon request, make the following available for
- 6 inspection by the department:
- 7 (a) Documentation of the instructional delivery methods used on nontraditional instruction
- 8 days;
- 9 (b) Evidence demonstrating the district provides access on nontraditional instruction days to
- online resources, if used, and equitable instructional materials for students who do not have
- access to the internet and for students needing to access information differently;
- 12 (c) Clear evidence demonstrating a continuation of learning from regular student attendance
- days occurs on nontraditional instruction days;[. Clear evidence may include:
- 14 1. Examples of student work;
- 15 2. Lesson plans; or
- 16 3. Curriculum maps.]
- 17 (d) Evidence demonstrating the district ensures implementation of Individual Education
- 18 Programs for students with disabilities, including the involvement of the Admissions and
- 19 Release Committee in planning for and making decisions related to the participation and needs
- 20 of students with disabilities, on nontraditional instruction days;
- 21 (e) Evidence demonstrating the district ensures implementation of other student-specific
- 22 educational plans, including Program Service Plans for English Learners and Gifted Student
- 23 Service Plans for students identified as gifted and talented, on nontraditional instruction days;

- 1 (f) Data demonstrating student participation and student learning on nontraditional instruction
- 2 days;
- 3 (g) Evidence demonstrating how each job category within the district fulfills contractual
- 4 obligations on nontraditional instruction days and data, including teacher work logs,
- 5 demonstrating employee participation on nontraditional instruction days;
- 6 (h) The professional learning plan implemented by the district to ensure certified staff have the
- 7 knowledge and capacity to provide instruction on nontraditional instruction days and evidence
- 8 demonstrating implementation;
- 9 (i) Where appropriate, agreements about nontraditional instruction days between the district
- and educational agencies that are external to the district but have students of the district in
- 11 attendance on a part-time or full-time basis;
- 12 (j) Evidence demonstrating stakeholder involvement in developing and implementing
- 13 nontraditional instruction days;
- 14 (k) Methods used by the district to relay information about nontraditional instruction days to
- 15 students and families; and
- 16 (I) Other evidence deemed necessary by the department to effectively monitor the
- implementation of the approved nontraditional instruction plan, including amendments if
- 18 applicable.
- 19 Section 5. Corrective Action.
- 20 (1)[(4)] The commissioner or his designee may require a period of corrective action and
- 21 <u>enhanced monitoring [revoke approval]</u> of a district's nontraditional instruction program as a
- result of evidence collected pursuant to [this] monitoring conducted under section 4 of this
- 23 <u>regulation</u>.

- 1 (2) [(5)] If the determination to require corrective action was made as the result of off-site
- 2 monitoring, the district [Prior to having approval of its nontraditional instruction program
- 3 revoked, a district] shall receive a site visit from a review team selected and trained by the
- 4 department. The site visit shall include the same requirements as the on-site monitoring visit in
- 5 section 4. [The purpose of the visit shall be to monitor the district's progress in implementing
- 6 the nontraditional instruction program, collect qualitative data on the effectiveness of the
- 7 nontraditional instruction program, and verify the district's compliance with all applicable laws.
- 8 A site visit shall be made following adequate advance notice to the district and may include the
- 9 gathering of information through:
- 10 (a) Direct observation;
- 11 (b) Interviews with staff and students; or
- 12 (c) Examination of records.
- 13 (3) Following the on-site monitoring, the Department will develop a corrective action plan in
- collaboration with the district. The corrective action plan shall include:
- (a) A description of each area of noncompliance identified by the monitoring team and the
- supporting evidence used to identify the area of noncompliance;
- 17 (b) Specific actions to be taken by the district to remedy issues of noncompliance; and
- 18 (c) A timeline for the completion of the specific actions required in paragraph (b) above.
- 19 (4) A district shall be released from corrective action following the successful completion of the
- 20 corrective action plan.
- 21 (5) A district that has exited corrective action shall undergo an on-site monitoring visit in the
- 22 <u>school year following the completion of the corrective action plan to ensure that compliance</u>
- 23 <u>has been sustained.</u>
