Year at a Glance: Suggested Tasks for August

- Review and update parent/guardian notification materials (testing transparency, teacher qualification request letter). Distribute materials by direct and indirect means no later than the beginning of the school year.
- Revise and align the GMAP application and Enterprise ERP (EERP) from previous year.
- Develop a system to collect and organize documentation related to the district's Title I program for state monitoring reviews.
- Consult with district (human resources or finance) staff on comparability requirements (list of federally funded and non-federally funded staff). Please refer to KDE's <u>Title I Comparability</u> <u>Guide</u> for additional information surrounding this requirement.
- Review and update student selection criteria sheet and student selection procedure if there
 are any targeted assistance schools in your district.
- Ensure Title I schools have created rank-ordered student selection lists of Title I students in targeted assistance schools.
- Verify that private school services, when applicable, begin at the same time as services begin
 in public schools.



Carryover Limitation

- Section 1127(a) of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) states that not more than 15% of the funds allocated to a district for any fiscal year may remain available for obligation for one additional fiscal year.
- Districts must ensure that at least 85% of school year 2024-2025 (Project 310L) funds are obligated for activities that occur no later than Sept. 30, 2025.
- As stated in ESSA 1127(c), this carryover limitation does not apply to districts that receive less than \$50,000 in Title I, Part A funds for the fiscal year.



Carryover Limitation Waiver

- Any district wishing to request a carryover waiver for 2024-2025 funds may do so no later than Sept. 30, 2025, by emailing David Millanti.
- The carryover waiver request email must:
 - State that the district requests a waiver of the 15% carryover limitation for school year 2024-2025 funds;
 - Contain the reason for the excess carryover; and
 - Describe a plan for effectively using carryover funds.

Family Partnership Council (FPC): Serving in an advisory role to the Kentucky Department of Education, this council provides input regarding topics of interest to families, such as ways that families and communities can assist schools in ensuring that the achievement level of all students is increased. The council also aligns itself to KDE's mission to create broad partnerships to provide leadership and support to ensure every student is equipped for the future. School-based Decision Making (SBDM) Councils: Membership of each SBDM council is comprised of parents, teachers and an administrator of the school. SBDM councils promote shared leadership among those who are closest to the students with a shared focus on enhancing student achievement. Members are elected and have the responsibility to set school policy and make decisions outlined in statute.

Helping Your Child Succeed Academically

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Families are the first and most important teachers for any child. Strong family engagement is central in helping children get off to a great start academically, beginning in kindergarten and continuing all the way to high school graduation. Knowing how to academically support your child at home is a key ingredient for their educational success. Resources are available to help parents and families in providing that support to their child's learning and gain a better understanding of the school and its overall performance.

Chronic absenteeism not only affects students' ability to have academic success, it can also have an impact on student health and overall well-being, leading to issues later in life. You can find many resources around the "You Belong: Attendance Matters" including a You Belong! Attendance Matters Video, strategies for families, community members and educators. When is Sick Too Sick for School? provides guidance to parents and families on making attendance decisions. Helping with Anxiety offers guidance for dealing with student anxiety affecting school attendance. Chronic Absenteeism At a Glance defines chronic absenteeism and contains many answers to frequently asked questions around student absences. You and Your Child Matter is a one-page flyer parents and families can use to track their child's attendance with a color-coding system of green, yellow and red.

<u>The Family Guides</u>: Resources are available for families and educators of children birth to age five. Topics include the growth and development of infants, toddlers and preschoolers, along with understanding and working with children with disabilities;

• Family Resource Guide - 6th Grade

GRADE 6 MATHEMATICS

OVERVIEW:

During 6th grade, students will develop the ability to divide numbers greater than nine, perform all four operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division) with multi-digit decimals, and write, read and evaluate expressions in which letters stand for numbers. Your child will:

- · Use variables to write and solve equations and inequalities that model what is happening in the real world;
- · Reason about relationships among geometric figures when solving real-world and mathematical problems; and
- Develop an increased ability to think statistically.

Examples of Your Child's Work at School:

- Solving and explaining problems that involve a fraction divided by a fraction;
- · Using a number line to place positive and negative numbers (with whole numbers, fractions and decimals);
- Using rates to find the better buy when shopping and answering questions about speed (for example, miles per hour).
- Noticing when two expressions are equivalent; and
- Formulating statistical questions and gathering data to answer those questions.

How to Help Your Child at Home:

- Talk to your child about realistic situations where negative numbers have meaning, such as negative balances in a checking
 account or the difference in having a balance on a credit card and a balance in a checking account.
- · Talk with your child about finding the "better buy" when you are shopping together.
- Find realistic opportunities that allow your child to find the area, surface area and perimeter of shapes, such as how much
 carpet to cover a floor, how much paint you need to cover a wall and how much wrapping paper to cover a box.

Ouestions You Can Ask Your Child:

- Would you rather have a positive balance on a credit card or a checking account? Why?
- Questions that encourage proportional reasoning, such as, "If a box of pencils cost \$4, how much does each pencil cost if there are 10 in a box?"

Questions You Can Ask Your Child's Teacher:

- Does my child need to work on any basic skills at home?
- What do you think is giving my child the most trouble? How can I help her or him improve in this area?
- How much time should my child spend on homework each night?
- Should my child use a calculator on homework?
- Are there any tools (resources, websites, etc.) that we can access at home that will help him or her in the classroom?
- What will my child be learning this year? How can I support her or his development in that area?

Students arrive at school with a variety of needs. Kentucky's public schools offer many programs and supports to meet the diverse needs of all students from preschool to high school graduation. Information is available on parental rights, procedural information and how to be the best advocate for your child.

English Learner and Immigrant Resources: Tools and resources are available to support English language learners and immigrants. This resource includes <u>parent notification timelines</u> for districts to follow. The website also includes several resources regarding legal obligations and rights of English learner and immigrant students.

The <u>Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA)</u> is the federal law which ensures children with disabilities have access to a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE). The <u>Parent and Family Rights</u> website provides families with a review of this federal law, including information on how to advocate for their child. <u>What is the Special Education Process?</u> walks parents through the steps by which children are identified as having a disability and in need of special education and related services. This document is available in Spanish, Arabic, and Swahili.

The <u>Kentucky Parent Guide for Special Education</u> is a comprehensive resource which guides parents through the special education process. The Admission and Release Committee, often referred to simply as "ARC", is fully explained in the <u>Admission</u> and <u>Release Committee Guide including its membership requirements, including parents, working together to create</u>

Wellness and Whole-Child Supports

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Collaboration between the school, government agencies, community organizations and businesses enhance the positive impact of the community coming together to support the whole child. Research shows a link between the health outcomes of students and their academic success. Each community has something unique to offer in this collaboration, from health and wellness to academic support to jobs after high school and to post-secondary education opportunities. This collaborative and comprehensive approach can create the best possible outcomes for all students.

Family Involvement: Family engagement with schools is a shared responsibility of both school staff and families. School staff are committed to making families feel welcomed, engaging families in a variety of meaningful ways, and sustaining family engagement. Families are committed to actively supporting their child's learning and development. This relationship between school staff and families cuts across and reinforces student health and learning in multiple settings—at home, in school, in out-of-school programs, and in the community. Family engagement should be continuous across a child's life and requires an ongoing commitment as children mature into young adults. There are a variety of opportunities to grow your knowledge of family engagement and leadership development included in the Family and Parent Toolbox. The Kentucky Collaborative for Families and Schools and the Commonwealth Institute for Parent Leadership (CIPL) are two examples which foster the progress of Kentucky's public schools.

Full-Service Community Schools: The Kentucky Community School Initiative (KCSI) seeks to create better outcomes for Kentucky students and to reduce barriers to learning. Through shared collaborative leadership, each unique community is integral to student success. Full-service community schools are engaged in moving from more programs to increased local coordination, silos to collaborative leadership, random acts of programming to intentionality for high-impact, schools working alone to groundswell action and doing "for" to listening and doing "with" families and communities.

Whole School, Whole Child, Whole Community (WSCC): A student-centered model emphasizing the role of the community in supporting the school, with emphasis on connections between health and academic achievement. Research shows a link between the health outcomes of young people and their academic success. To have the most positive impact on the health outcomes of young people, government agencies, community organizations, schools, and other community members must work together through a collaborative and comprehensive approach. This site explores overall health connections from nutrition, physical activity to social emotional health.


