

Kentucky Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2023 Public Reporting Title IV, Part A

Title IV, Part A, also known as the Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE) grant, is part of the 2015 Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), a reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) of 1965. The Title IV-A program is intended to improve academic achievement for students by increasing the capacity of state educational agencies (SEAs), local educational agencies (LEAs), and local communities to provide all students with:

- Access to a well-rounded education
- Improved school conditions that enhance student learning and support safe and healthy students
- Effective uses of technology to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students

Kentucky uses a formula grant to ensure the eligible districts in the state that received Title I allocations in the previous school year receive funding under Title IV-A. The minimum award is \$10,000. Awards to LEAs in FFY 2023 ranged from \$10,000 to \$3,896,256.

Kentucky State Level Title IV-A Expenditure Data for FFY 2023

Kentucky received a total of \$20,936,968.00 in Title IV-A funds for the FFY 2023/GMAP FY 2024. According to ESSA Section 4104, 1% of that total is set aside for state administration (\$209,370.00) and 4% is to be utilized for state-level activities (\$837,478.00). The remaining 95% of funds go to Kentucky's LEAs (\$19,890,120.00) for allowable activities, based on the descriptions in ESEA Sections [4107](#), [4108](#), and [4109](#).

Kentucky Public Reporting Period for FFY 2023

This public report reflects data from the FFY 2023 Title IV-A award and covers the reporting period of July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. The data included represents a single federal fiscal year award and may include funds carried over from prior Federal fiscal years. All data presented in this report was self-reported by local educational agencies.

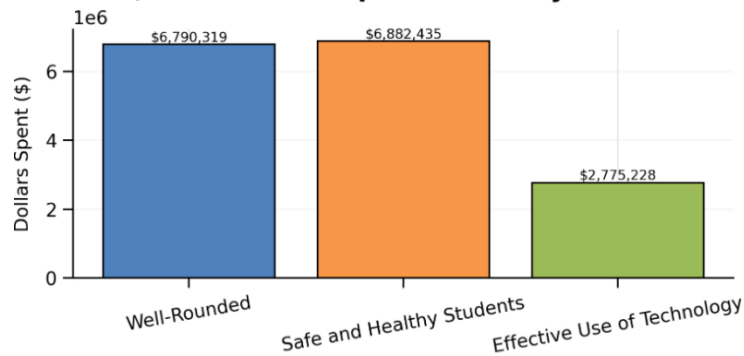
LEA Expenditure Data for Title IV-A for FFY 2023

The table below shows the number of LEAs who spent funds under Title IV-A of the ESEA, separated by three content areas. Funds were also used to provide equitable services to participating nonpublic schools. There are 171 school districts in Kentucky, of which all were eligible for Title IV-A during the 2023 FFY federal grant reporting period. A waiver was granted for FFY 2023 that extended funds through June 30, 2026.

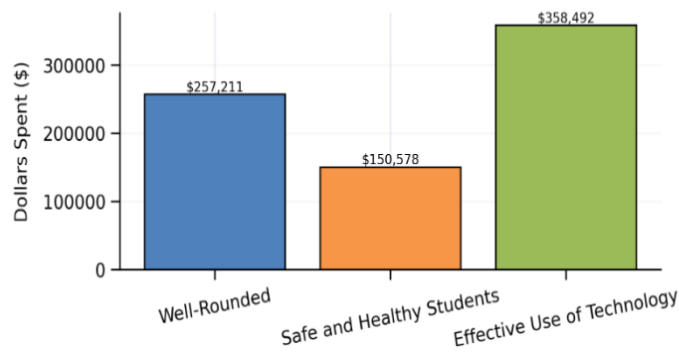
